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

Yes, my friends, at the Most Factory Magazine we have some really hectic stuff in store for you. So stay tuned. *







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

HOW TO GET A CO-SPONSORSHIP

So maybe you've been getting discouraged lately because your factory sponsorship plans have been stifled by the consistent shaft you get from every company you write. Well, nobody said it was going to be a yellow brick

If you've reached the point where you feel it's useless to keep trying for factory hardware, it's time for a compromise.

First of all, don't get down on the fac-

tories for not catering to you. A large number of the premier BMX companies have strict budgets for their teams, and sometimes these budgets leave out plans for a rising star like yourself. Also, many of the companies are hesitant to invest about 500 dollars in factory equipment for someone they know very little about.

Is there an answer to the dilemma? Sure. If you compromise between privateer and factory, the bike shop/ factory co-sponsorship situation will surface as the best alternative.

Before we get into the specifics of getting some co-sponsors, let's go over a little background on what sponsorship is all about. Basically, the name of the game is influence. The duty of every sponsored rider is to influence others to buy the products of their particular sponsor or sponsors.

Let's look at a fictional case ex-

Byron Kite, a privateer, has been rapidly rising to the top of the BMX scene. He kicked PK's rear at the last national, and he consistently wales on Stanley Robinson. All of Byron's feats have not gone unnoticed, though, JP Gnarler, the president of BMX Specialties, Inc., has recognized Byron's talent and in conjunction with The Wheel and Rim, a local bike shop, has signed Byron for a co-sponsorship.

When Byron accepted the co-sponsorship of BMX Specialties and The Wheel and Rim, he assumed a massive obligation . . . the position of ambassador for both the factory and the bike shop. This means he is responsible for promoting BOTH companies ALL the

At this point you may well ask, "Oh, you mean he has to win a lot of races?"

Well, that's only part of it. The other part consists of aiding and abetting fellow racers, talking things up before the races, and generally lending a hand to anyone at the track who needs help. Just because you're sponsored.

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

don't think you're too good to talk to the non-sponsored riders. Remember that those other guys are potential customers for your sponsors. Besides, it just plain makes sense to buddy up . . . you meet a lot of nice people that way.

If you're the type of person that has plenty of energy and is willing to work full-buns for a factory and bike shop, then you would make a good prospect for co-sponsorship. If you win a lot of races but aren't into the public relations aspect of BMX ... forget it.

Anyway, it's time to get back to the "how to" of getting co-sponsors.

The first thing you need to do is contact your favorite local bike shop. You know, the one where you hang out all the time and generally do most of your business. I hope you're on good terms with the owner... otherwise you'll have a hard time talking him into investing a little money.

Your job at this point is to convince this guy that you're the hottest thing since the Hula-Hoop; that his business will increase with you spreading the word at the local tracks; and that you are a walking reference library about what's hot in BMX equipment . . and what's lame. This last point by itself could easily save him the cost of the sponsor-shin

Be sure to stress that he's actually going to be putting out very little money . . . just enough to cover jerseys, maybe entry fees, a discount on parts, and a few other odds and ends. This is pretty much your basic bike shop sponsorship.

But now enter the second part of the deal . . . The Factory.


If you can put it together, the factory is going to come in where the bike shop leaves off . . . parts and accessories, stickers and hats, and good deals on things like team pants and helmets. Not a full-factory freebie deal, but considerably better than trying to do it on your own.

But wait a minute. Maybe you're saying to yourself, "Man, I was blown away at the last national, so there's no way I can get a co-sponsorship." Ah, but you've been deceived, my friend. How many bike shops do you know that do business on a nationwide scale? Not yery many, huh?

You see, your bike shop probably has a customer radius of anywhere from 10 to a 100 miles. Same goes for the track radius . . . 10 to a 100 miles is about the distance riders will travel to the races.

Translation: As long as you jam at the local track, you could qualify for a bike shop—and possibly a bike shop/factory—sponsorship situation.

Sure, Clinton and Stuart may come





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
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Pedals should be level. You should visualize yourself going around in a 360. (Check Curtis' facial expression.)

Just when you think there's nothin' else you can do on a bicycle, somebody comes up with a new trick that blows holes in your shorts. And it usually happens so fast you'd think the pastrami, onion, and anchovy burger you had for lunch is playing tricks on your eyes. Well, boys and girls, break out your trick bike 'cause the magazine which is most factory has a new one.

Similar to the famed Rock Walk, but

slightly more advanced, is the 360 Roll Out. I'd suggest that as a prerequisite you at least know how to do a Rock Walk (BMXA, Jan/Feb 1979), as the 360 Roll Out is pretty tough.

The inventor of this rad trick is my ol' army buddy, Curtis Louie. Curtis rides for Molina's Cycle Center in Stockton. Molina's was cool enough to pay the freight to get Curtis down to SoCal for this photo session. If you're ever in the NorCal area, check this shop out. It's totally first class BMX equipped.

When told of this trick I thought it was going to be just the regular stand-still 360. But no, it's done at cruisin' speed. Pretty hectic, Curtis!

Enough intro, now for the news. As always, wear protective gear. A helmet and elbow pads are the bare minimum. Trick riding is more than just doing the trick. You must also learn how to bail out without gettin' thrashed. So wear gear.

360 Roll Outs should be performed on a fairly flat and smooth surface.

CO-SPONSORSHIP around once in a while to try and spread the word of SER and Red Line, but the main thrust will consist of YOU: the dude that's out there every week, rain or shine. And if you're flying the flag for a bike shop and a factory while you're out there, there's going to be a lot of influence floatin' around. So don't think you have to be nationally ranked to get some sponsors. Okay, let's assume that you are one of the few who put the whole program together and picked up a co-sponsorship. So what are the bike shop and the factory getting out of all this? Plenty. Say, for instance, you're out at the track one Saturday and you clean up in your main. Ted Smith, a younger, newer racer, happened to watch your race and was very impressed. So impressed, in fact, that he talked his dad into buying him a bike just like yours. After the races, it's off to the local shop (the one you ride for, of course), where Ted's father goes for the whole enchilada and lays out 300 dollars for a "Sure," you say, "the bike shop cleans up on that kind of deal, but what about the factory?" Simple. If the bike shop starts selling a lot of your make of bike, they'll have to start ordering more from the factory to replace the ones they've sold. The factory kicks at this point. So now you've nabbed a co-sponsorship and everything's cool, except for one thing . . . you're greedy and still want that full-factory ride. No sweat. Besides winning a national number one plate, the best way to get factory sponsored is via a co-sponsor deal. Remember when I told you that factories are reluctant to invest 500 dollars in someone they know very little about? Well, a good way for them to get to know you is through your deeds as a rider under the co-sponsorship If you've really gotten with the program while riding for a certain factory, they're going to take notice. If they feel your caliber of riding is approaching the national level, they're going to consider promoting you to full-factory, and maybe even fly you to a few nationals. This program has been successfully used by many East Coast riders who live far from their SoCal based sponsors. And it works. That's about the gist of the co-sponsorship deal. Keep in mind that these things are not given away to anybody who walks in off the street. They must be earned . . . in spades. Also keep in mind




that it's a whole lot easier to talk bike

shops and factories into splitting costs

than trying to talk one of the two into

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
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


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CRUISIN BIEYELE MOTOCROSS ACTION CRUISER REPORT

When told about doing this article, I thought it would be a piece of cake picking a test bike, seeing as how there are only a few companies manufacturing cruisers. Not so, I learned shortly. Most major bicycle companies are either making them already, tooling up for it, or thinking about it very seriously.

So, to pick this month's test cruiser, I put the names of all the possibles in a hat, and pulled out Laguna. (That's just so's ya know we do things fair around here.)

The Laguna cruiser has a mild steel frame with double top tube construction. It is heli-arc welded throughout with the same care and effort put forth on the Laguna BMX machines. Sano work.

In the steering department the Laguna is graced with leading axle forks made of chrome-moly.

Well, you've got to know us well enough by now to know that we can't leave a good thing alone. So, it was off to the tool box and then minor surgery on the bars. We removed three inches from each end, junked the plastic grips, and added Oakleys. We also removed all the reflectors and the chain guard, and basically set it up according to our personal preferences. Once this stuff was done, the Laguna was tons more cruisable.

The Laguna cruiser has a functional look to it. Instead of the bent down tube and seat stays found on the Schwinn, it has all straight tubes except for the top tube. Although the price is higher than the Schwinn Spitfire, the clean lines and tubular forks are going to make this bike hard to beat. Jammin' around on it is just too cool for school. Fun City. And once the Bendix rear coaster brake is worn in, coaster wheelies become a

The Laguna comes with chromed steel rims laced with 80 gauge spokes. These relatively light wheels keep the overall package at a not-quite feathery 37½ pounds, which is light for a cruiser.



But light weight also means sacrificing strength. During one of our test sessions we tweaked the rear wheel. We suggest that you run 105 gauge spokes if you plan on jumpin' and thrashin' your cruiser. If you are just going to be a mello rider then 80 gauge spokes will hold up just fine

If your buns have been cryin' the Plastic Seat Blues, then they're gonna love you now. Laguna equips their cruisers with top class sitters—the Cadillac of cruiser seats—Mesinger. It's one of those super-wide coil-spring seats with tons of padding, made to handle gnarly bumps.

Shimano makes the Ashtabula-style forged steel gooseneck that comes stock on the Laguna. Although this stem is fine for local buzzin', it is a tad on the weak side for heavy jammin'. A BMX stem would assure no bar slippage. The only one we know of off hand that fits the flare of the steerhorn bars is the Tuf-Neck with a one inch clamp. Or you can

use one that has enough space between the clamps to span the flare, like the Mongoose Gold Stem.

When we first started riding the Laguna we expected it to be very sluggish. But this bike, because of its fairly light weight, picks up and boogies (remember this isn't your 300 buck BMX racer). With practice an experienced rider could learn to get pretty stylish and do some fairly hectic tricks on this bike. We'll keep you posted on any new developments in this area.

As far as really having to change anything on the Laguna, it depends on personal preference and on what you plan to use it for. Already available are those class looking anodized alloy cruiser rims from Araya. Customizing is part of the fun of owning one of these bikes. Because there's tons of BMX parts available for cruisers, in the future we will cover the tricking-out of one of these bikes. So stay tuned.



have in mind. Then you should check into the goosenecks with heavy-duty stems and large-surface multi-bolt aluminum clamps for the best handlebar holding properties.

Then compare the forward cant dimensions and the photos of the individual goosenecks to determine where





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a certain one will place your bars. Compare this info to where your current gooseneck locates your bars, and you should be starting to zero in on the best gooseneck for you.

Then, to fine-tune your selection even further, compare weight, colors, price, and quarantees

The most remarkable thing about Texas is that the Texans look and act just like you'd expect Texans to look and act ... cowboy boots, cowboy hats, Okie accents, friendly, big Cadillacs with steer horns on the hood, biscuits and gravy for breakfast ... the whole thing.

TOBY HENDERSON: I like the indoor thing. The turns are a little

The Pro purse was a cool grand. And the first place Pro finisher would win a ring. Which sounded a little hokey to some of the Pro's . . . until they saw it. There were enough diamonds on it to use as bearings in your steering head! Things get un-hokey pretty quick when you start talking about diamonds.

DANNY OAKLEY: This is Tinker's kind of track. . . .

Last year the Amarillo race was held outside, victim to the quicksilver whims of summer Texas weather. This year the ABA wanted no truck with the sudden monsoons. They wanted a lead-pipe cinch, so they took the show

The Amarillo Coliseum, a big ol' hulk of a building that more commonly hosts rodeos and horse shows, became the field of honor for the ABA 1979 Summernationals.

To the best of our knowledge, this is the first major national indoor race on a dirt track. Zounds! It's the bicycle Superbowl of Motocross!

GREG HILL: I never thought they'd have this . . . a thousand dollar purse AND a thousand dollar diamond ring. That's pretty cool.

You know the third light's busted. You concentrate on not letting it throw your timing off. You're up on two pedals, the hot tip start for ABA electronic gates. Your gearing is an incredibly low 42-16 because of the short straights, tight turns, and total traction of the indoor Amarillo track.

Your entire being is focused like a laser beam on the lights. If only that

Because this is practice, you picture in your mind the loudspeaker reverberating off the walls of the arena: RIDERS READY ... WATCH THE LIGHTS .

Red! (It's coming. Tighten up!) Yellow! (Timing . . . watch your

(The burned-out light . . . should be another yellow. Don't let it . . .) GREENIII

You're out of the gate . . . exploded into a wild, thrashing, silent world that is a total concentration of power and effort. You know there's a little power left . . . vou just don't quite know how to reach it, how to apply it. Maybe it'll come when you need it most.

Assume you've got the hole shot . . . now you must move toward the hot inside line, closing the door on those to your left if you can. You know that during this critical section between the gate and the first jump (an eternity in three seconds) harsh body contact (that the spectators rarely see) can throw your concentration off . . . and you MUST hold concentration, or it's all

The first jump. A speed jump. Bunnyhop it, wheelie over it, whatever gets you over quickest. Pedal right over it if you can. One extra pedal can win the

First berm. Got to be inside. Anywhere else buys you a hay bale lunch. Stay close to the tires. Use minimal brakes. Try it feet up.

Second straight. Extremely short. Get back on the pedals, drift out a little, keep the door closed, get in as many pedals as possible before diving into . . .

... the second turn. Shoot through on the inside. Only go up on the berm to pass. Move to the outside as soon as you exit the turn. Re-apply max power. You should be flyin'. Drift to the far outside line on this straight, right up against the concrete arena wall

Second jump . . . splitting the straight ... kind of a low table-top. You gotta wheelie . . . it doesn't work to bunnyhop it. Keep your weight back to keep from getting pitched over the bars. Stick the front end down on the far side.

Keep the back wheel on the ground. drivin'. You lose by mistakes . . . you win by inches gained.

Max power. The straight is aiming you right at a high-banked full-hairpin left turn. Dive in kind of wide, brake hard, rise up on the berm, muscle the front end around, pedal hard and wheelie coming out so the front wheel doesn't crab on you in the patch of soft stuff. This turn is boggish coming out.

Pedal as hard as you can down the straight. Best thing on the next turn is to hit the bank on the outside, wide. This berm is so short that if somebody swoops you on the inside, you still have a chance of holding them off. So come in wide and fast, watch the loose stuff on top, brake hard, let off half way through, stay high on the bank. Keep your front wheel down and use the backside of the berm to slingshot you onto the finish straight.

From there it's time to use up any last reserves of energy sprinting to the

DAVID CLINTON: Didia see that ring? Man, this is gonna be WFO!

Through the motos Tinker was flvin'. Ruminer and Frank Post, Patterson's new factory dude, were hot. David had dollar signs in his eyes, and that's bad for the other racers 'cause Clinton is a jackpot competitor.



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

of trophies settin' there, a 1500 dollar Pro purse promised, and gross amounts of other things like insurance and rent and advertising gobbling up your money like some kind of giant monster In-Sink-Erator, then things can get just a little tense.

But it all came out fine. Maybe it wasn't the biggest race in the history of the sport, and maybe there was something less than scads of out-ofstate racers there, and maybe most of the Pro's didn't show. But it turned out to be one of those magical times when (to quote Matt Raymer) all the factors come together. It was a great race. It was a class affair. Everybody who was there went back to wherever they came from and, wide-eyed, told tales of amazing and wonderous things. Like the Amarillo "Y'all come" hospitality, and the hot competition at the race, and all them Texas moon babes.

That was last year. This year at Amarillo there were nearly 800 signups, scads and scads of out-of-staters, most of the big time factory teams, and almost every big name Pro in the U.S. of A.

Texas, in one short year, has placed itself solidly on the BMX map. And the Amarillo race has shouldered its way in among the heavies . . . the giants . . . the national classics. 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


You can pursue Pro purses, points, powder puffers, or pit tootsies. Or you can just go for a neat vacation.



Endurance and overall strategy were of critical importance at Lawrenceburg. After running a couple motos, many racers who had entered two classes pulled from one so they could concentrate their rapidly diminishing supplies of energy on whichever was their more important class.

But while many racers were near collapse at the finish line—getting oxygen from the paramedics or tossing their cookies—others were buns-out all day.

And that's pretty much how it went in Lawrenceburg, Tennessee, sports fans.




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NBL WAR OF THE STARS SERIES


